such surgery has now become a laparoscopic procedure.

- I have a personal series of 124 restorative proctocolectomies (RP) performed in children, and believe this to be the largest series under a paediatric surgeon in the UK; the last 75 pouches have been laparoscopic procedures.
- I have pioneered ileal pouch surgery for children in the UK, and my analysis of complications for this major procedure has been published, recording some of the lowest reported complication rates[1].
- My entire ileal pouch series is recorded on the UK national ileal pouch registry, and I was invited to write a commentery on ileal pouch surgery in children for the second report of the Uk national ileal pouch registry

- I have also published outcomes for laparoscopic RP and an analysis of reasons for pouch loss in the Journal of Pediatric Surgery[2].
- Becasuse of the complexity of laparoscopy restorative proctocolectomy, I travel to Leeds to assist my colleagues in that city with this surgery. To date, I have assisted with 8 cases in Leeds.
- I have performed 118 resections on 105 children for Crohn's disease, and believe this to be the largest single surgeon experience in Europe. The outcomes have been published in the Journal of Pediatric Surgery[3].
- The last 70 resections have been laparoscopic procedures.
- Surgical treatment of gastro-oesophageal reflux
  - I am particularly interested in the long term outlook of children who have undergone anti-reflux procedures, and in revisional surgery.
  - o I currently have a cohort of over 400 such children under my care
  - I introduced laparoscopic fundoplication to my region, with the last 300 consecutive cases performed laparoscopically.
  - I have developed expertise in revisional fundoplications and have completed over 80 revisional procedures, the last 50 of which have been laparoscopic procedures, irrespective of the nature of the original surgery. I perform all revisional hiatal surgery within Newcastle.
  - I published in the British Journal of Surgery a study on survival following anti-reflux surgery in children, showing the devastating effects of neurological impairment on the prognosis for these children[4]
- Colo-rectal surgery in children
  - This consists of the above group of children with colitis, and also babies suffering from Hirschsprung's disease and imperforate anus. Almost all babies undergo a one stage laparoscopic assisted procedure in the first week of life.
  - My personal cohort of Hirschsprung's disease children now exceeds 88 pull through procedures.
  - I have a special interest in the surgical treatment of severely constipated children, and have a cohort of over 200 such children currently under treatment. The outcomes of this treatment have been published in the Journal of Pediatric Surgery. Link to ACE outcomes publication. I have also in 2010 published the first description of the use of restorative proctocolectomy for this condition, having obtained ethical committee approval for this novel approach[5].
  - I have published the first report of laparoscopic rectopexy in children from the UK in the Journal of Pediatric Surgery[6]: <u>Link to laparoscopic</u> <u>rectopexy publication</u>
  - I have the largest single surgeon experience of the ACE procedure worldwide[7]
- Paediatric laparoscopic surgery

- o I have introduced laparoscopic surgery to this centre
- I was responsible for co-ordinating the large scale charitable fundraising to enable capital purchase of equipment, currently having secured £700000.
- When commencing laparocopic surgery, I organised my training to comply with the highest standards of clinical governance, and was praised by the hospital management for the process
- Since September 2003, when our equipment was installed, we have completed over 4000 separate minimally invasive procedures in children as young as one week of age.
- With the manufacturers, Richard Wolf, I designed and commissioned the installation of two integrated laparoscopic theatres to the new Great North Children's Hospital in Newcastle.
- In 2018 we completed a complete overhall of our laparoscopic theatres. This involved draughting a detailed specification, initiating a public tender process and overseeing the design, commissioning and installation of two new theatres. I was the surgical lead for this process.
- Surgery for short bowel syndrome
  - I introduced the STEP procedure to this centre, and have personally performed all bowel lengthening procedures in Newcastle since my appointment.
  - To date I have performed 13 procedures in 7 children.
  - There has been no mortality from SBS in Newcastle in the past 16 years, adopting a multi-discplinary approach to this complex group of children.
- Surgical outcomes
  - I have published the most highly cited study on the mortality of congenital diaphragmatic hernia. I showed that mortality was related to the rate of associated anomalies and the rate of ante-natal termination. I showed that the introduction of ECMO, nitric oxide and high frequency ventilation has made little difference to mortality[8]
  - I have published an analysis of survival for babies born with oesophageal atresia. Using logistic regression, I showed that in the modern era, birthweight was not a significant factor, but that severe renal anomalies had a profound effect[9]
  - I am interested in the diagnostic accuracy of acute appendicitis in children, and am currently analysing a dataset of over 550 such cases. Of interest is the negative appendicectomy rate among teenage girls, which approaches 40%.
  - I maintain a detailed database of surgical activity and outcomes, using this to inform my clinical research.
- Bariatric surgery
  - I have established a multi-disciplinary group of professionals to evaluate children before laparoscopic bariatric surgery. I believe we were the first centre in the UK to have such a group, consisting of a general paediatrician, a paediatric endocrinologist, a paediatric respiratory physician, a dietitician, a psychologist and a paediatric surgeon. We have successfully treated a number of children with laparoscopic gastric bypass and sleeve gastrectomy.
